PROGRAM

ORGANIC DEMETER-FARM

Let's get our hands dirty, learn about the Green Belt and find out where healthy food comes from. Together we'll get acquainted with farm animals, take on farm tasks and learn about ingredients for delicious dishes.

STAFFELBERG

On the Staffelberg, there are remnants of millennia-old buildings. Explore the culture of Upper Franconia – from the Stone Age and the Celts to the fields of today, rich in wild herbs.

PRACTICAL WORK WITH OUR FARMER

Get involved! We'll accompany a shepherd or a cattle farmer in his daily work and learn about landscape maintenance, nature conservation and more by clearing up a plot of land together and preparing it for sheep to graze on. We might even have the opportunity to visit a farm, look at the animals there and talk to the farming family.
